
Pull Yourself up by Your Bootstraps Meaning



- Definition: To improve one's situation through hard work and self-determination, rather than getting assistance from someone else.
- Origin of Pull Yourself up by Your Bootstraps
- This expression originated in the 1800s. It refers to the ability of a person to lift himself or herself up by pulling on the laces of his or her boots. Of course, this is impossible, so in order to do it would take very hard work.
- The idiom refers to the fact that sometimes it takes hard work to overcome something or become successful, and sometimes the only person who can do that hard work is yourself. At some point, no amount of help or assistance can help someone. You simply need to pull yourself up by your bootstraps.

COVID-19

- Disease caused by RNA virus

- Designated a pandemic in March 2020
- Zoonotic disease (Bat plus intermediate host?)
- >97% Homologous to bat Coronavirus RaTG13
- Novel disease
- Not the only human Corona Virus
- Deadly




Symptoms of SARS-CoV-2 infection

Asymptomatic

- Death
- Fever
- Fatigue
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Loss of appetite
- Cognitive/Memory changes

- Diarrhea
- Shivering
- breathing difficulties
- hypoxia-low levels of oxygen in the blood
- High temperature
- A continuous, dry cough
- Loss of the sense of taste and smell.

- Agent: HINI
- Global Population: 1.8 billion
- Deaths (Global): 20-50 million
- US Population: 103 million
- Deaths (US): 675,000

2019-2022 COVID pandemic

- Agent: SARS-CoV-2
- Global Population: 7.9 billion
- Deaths (Global): 3.8 million
- US Population: 331 million
- Deaths (US): 613,052

"...pandemics have always disproportionately affected Black, indigenous and Latinx people." Lakshmi Krishnan

- "When it came to getting healthcare during the 1918 influenza epidemic, America's Black communities, hobbled by **poverty**, Jim Crow segregation and rampant **discrimination**, were mostly **forced to fend for themselves**. Opportunities for hospital care proved scarce, leaving many relying on family care and, where available, the small but burgeoning ranks of Black nurses.
- When the 1918 influenza epidemic began, African Americans were already beset by a barrage of social, medical and public health problems, asserts Vanessa Northington Gamble. Among the challenges she identified in her 2010 study of the African American experience of the 1918 flu pandemic: 'racist theories of black biological inferiority, racial barriers in medicine and public health, and poor health status."

Fending for Ourselves...

"Health historians paint a picture of heroic efforts by handfuls of Black nurses and physicians working to serve their community. They also acknowledge the role of black churches, women's groups, newspapers and community leaders in stressing education and prevention, and in mobilizing local volunteers.

"There was a very community-driven response to secure the health of Black people who were ill and to also to make sure they realized that this was a serious illness," says S. Michelle Ogunwole, general internal medicine fellow at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and co-author of "Historical Insights on Coronavirus Disease 2019."

Why African-Americans are likely to die during the 2019-2022 Pandemic:

FOCUS ON AFRICAN- AMERICANS

Lives lost to date

- 142,361 Black Americans are known to have lost their lives to COVID-19 through April 30, 2022.
- There were 1,431 new deaths reported among Black Americans for the last full month of data (March 2022), which is a 74% decrease from the preceding month (5,431).
- Nationwide, Black Americans have experienced 14.3% of all deaths, while they represent 12.6% of the population.



COVID and Health Disparities


- COVID-19, Deadly Disease

- Allows health disparities to exist. We can do better.





Impact of COVID on communities of color








The USPHS Study of Untreated Syphilis in the Negro Male aka "Tuskegee Experiment" aka "The Tuskegee Syphilis Study"

- **NOT** a significant reason for health disparities related to COVID-19
- Fear of Side effects
- DISTRUST of the system







-Give everyone equal access to the FACTS and ACCURATE information so they can make an informed decision

-Post-pandemic: A future where WE are intentional and involved in preventative healthcare decisions for ourselves and our families and active in clinical trials (HBP and Diabetes)



The FACTS/TRUTH of the matter is...

- As of May 4, 2021: US= 680 deaths/day (almost 100% in unvaccinated); preventable
- Out of 95 million fully vaccinated (Pfiz/Mod) ~9K cases of mostly mild symptomatic infection (0.009%; or 99.991% protection from COVID)
- -Need for vaccinations (NOW)
- -New variants/ to come?
- -Largest spread, and <u>now</u> hospitalization, among young people (18-30)
- -HBCUs and vaccination; special importance
- -Events of the past overruling our better judgment

1. Vaccinations

- Had them for almost 100 years
- Key to increase in human population and longer life spans
- Greatly reduced, and in some cases almost eliminated deaths from childhood diseases
- Generally Safe and Effective

Pulling Ourselves Up by Our Bootstraps 2. Wear A Mask

- N95 or KN95
- Protects from other respiratory diseases as well
- Still available at some pharmacies, health departments, RAVE2
- Helps with allergy season
- Type of Mask is the key, based on exposure





FIGURE 1: Schematic diagram of SARS-CoV-2.
